REPORT August and September 2017

We experienced a few showers in the last two months. This has kept the Loita migration in the northern portion of the ecosystem.

General

With all of the crops out of the fields we have experienced much less human-elephant conflict in the last two months. This gave us a chance to focus on other activities. We sent reconnaissance to both Loita and the Mau Forest, held two general staff meetings, re-trained the rangers on using the WILD app, held several officer meetings, re-shuffled all patrol teams, and started a new fence monitoring team. The fence monitoring team is made up of two rangers with a motorbike and a GPS. They are systematically moving from the most northern extent of the ecosystem east to map fences in the Olkinyei and Maji Moto areas. Once this area is covered we will move south to cover the Siana and Loita areas. This is an ambitious project but they have made good progress already.

Using the WILD app, we have been able to quantify ranger patrol distances and improve daily reporting of the ranger teams to HQ. Daily use of the smartphones and populating the WILD patrol reports was not happening, as we would have liked. During the staff meetings and refresher courses we reiterated the importance of data collection through WILD and its ability to

monitor ranger performance. All ranger stations are now recording data daily on their smartphones and sending to HQ every evening.

On the 15th of September, we submitted an application for two unmanned aerial vehicles (UAVs) to be piloted by the CEO. The application process was rather extensive and needed a number of supporting documentation including UAV insurance, which was purchased.


Introduction:

Previously MEP rangers have been recording MIKE and HEC data manually with text message updates sent daily to HQ via mobile phones and written reports are recorded daily using a report book and brought to the HQ at the end of the month. Photographs taken by camera are also submitted at the end of the month and patrol tracks recorded by GPS are downloaded every two weeks.

Extracting the necessary information from the six books, patrol logs, cameras and GPS was extremely time consuming and left large margins for error. WILD is a mobile application design to improve the collection, sharing, management and analysis of ranger data. MEP has been using the WILD app since its inception in 2016. Unfortunately, rangers have not been collecting the data daily as required. Now all the rangers are required to log their patrols and incidents into WILD. This data collection is what guides us to directing our resources to the areas it's needed most.

Patrol Details:

The below screenshot illustrates the main concentration of our patrol teams and the reconnaissance team's tracks in Loita and Mau.



Recording Patrols

For the month of September MEP rangers managed to cover a distance of 1,072 km on foot and 1,133 km by car. The Enkutoto team covered the largest distance this month on foot at 362 km. Ranger's patrols logs are sent daily by each team and this is quite different compared to the GPS, which the rangers bring after every two weeks. These tracks will actually award the best team each quarter.

Wildlife Sightings

The easiest way of recording wildlife sightings is by taking photos on mobile phones and sending them immediately, which is a much quicker method of transferring the photos than rangers bringing their cameras and downloading the images after every two weeks. The team, which recorded the most sightings, was Olkinyei Conservancy and they sent good photographic evidence of the herd.

Recording Incidents:

Human wildlife conflicts

For the above period, we did not have too many incidents, Munyas and Kawai team recorded crop raiding incidents four and three days respectively, currently it's planting season hence less cases of conflicts, this will rise immediately when crops ripen. Property destruction of elephants breaking up fences was also recorded by Munyas.

Poaching

No poaching cases this month

Animal mortality

A dead elephant was found in Ildungisho village, the carcass was reported by Olkinyei team. The cause of death considered as human-elephant conflict, the cause was a spear wound.

Illegal human activity

Mobile team patrolling in the Loita and Mau Forest has been recording logging incidents inside the forest. Four people were arrested for logging in the Loita Naimina Enkiyio Forest.

The below report was built by the tracking manager and we will need to work with PREPARED and Strathmore university to generate reports automatically.

Fundraising:

MEP received a generous donation from Expert Drones this month to support the UAV program. We have also been selected as a beneficiary of this year's Tusk Safaricom Marathon and were invited to apply for a grant. There were two concept notes submitted during this reporting period. MEP is working on getting verified on Facebook and adding donation capabilities. We are also starting to market our helicopter Generosity campaign again. MEP's website was updated and re-launched on the 11th September including an enhanced Donate page with options for monthly giving.

Partnership Development:

Angama Lodge is running a Mara-themed photography competition, which is due to be launched on 1st November 2017. MEP has been chosen as one of six local charities that will benefit from the \$20 competition entry fee with entrants nominating the charity they wish to support. Angama have also kindly offered to showcase MEP's work in their new photography studio which is currently being built, including displaying one of MEP's old satellite tracking collars, giving guests the opportunity to sponsor a new one.

Security:

A gang has been operating in MEP's area of operation as previously reported. In September, the same suspected gang hit Mararienta on the 22nd September and then Aitong on the 27th September where they shot and wounded an Administration Police man. The gang is suspected

to come from Transmara and the Intel unit is working on the case with the police and local administration.

The Intel unit uncovered ivory sellers in Nairobi and set up a fake buy in the Kibera area along the railroad tracks. Our undercover ranger and informant met up with an undercover Kenya Wildlife Service team from their HQ and conducted the sting operation on the 26th of August. Unfortunately, during the arrest one of the suspects managed to turn the KWS officer's pistol muzzle onto the KWS officer and fired one round, which went through her thigh. They still managed to arrest the suspect and recover 36 kg of ivory. She was admitted to hospital and made a quick recovery.

HEC

HEC has decline significantly in this period. We are however gearing up for the next season by raising funds for the helicopter, making sure WILD is working for HEC recording, buying firecrackers and ensuring we strategically deploy when the season starts.

In the Transmara and Olongolin areas farmers have started planting (end of September). That means that our conflict season will start at the end of November.

Helicopter Update:

We have used the helicopter very little in this reporting period due to the decrease in HEC. The Certificate of Airworthiness and the CEO's license also expired in August and September and will be renewed.

Elephant Tracking:

On the 10th of September Lucy's collar broke off in the Nyekweri Forest. She was difficult to collar initially and we will need to work to find and collar her or another member of her herd in the thick forest.

On the 6th of August Nkoidilla's collar broke off in the Naikara near Loita. We are doubtful that she can be relocated and recollared. We have notified World Wildlife Fund of this and collected the collar.

Elephant Chiri had some interesting movements. She went on the 28th of August to the Loita Forest. We sent a team there to monitor her and she then came back very close to her starting point in Siana on the 12th of September. This is the first collared elephant to move into the Loita Forest from the Mara. The ground team recorded that she was with four elephants but there were many herds in the forest.

Elephant Courtney was treated on the 23rd of August in the Musiara Swamp area in the MMNR. When she was collared we pulled out 12 arrows and during treatment a 13th arrow was pulled out. Soon after the treatment she moved into the Mara North Conservancy.

Ivy has been moving into farms which do not have crops. We suspect she and her family are targeting family gardens and pumpkin patches.

Hanzhou seems to be staging on the base of the Siria Escarpment but has not gone into farms.

Although not part of MEP's mandate we assisted the Mara Conservancy to source and deploy an eartag on one of their rhinos called "Naeku".

Staff:

Each Friday morning, we will have officer's meetings at the HQ. All rangers were re-trained on WILD and were notified that performance will be measured using WILD reports.
